

FRUIT OF THE SPIRIT

INTRODUCTION

We often say that God loves us just as we are, but that He also loves us enough not to let us stay that way. Salvation is not just a one-time event. It is an ongoing process in which we are transformed by the Spirit of God and fitted for heaven. The work of the Holy Spirit in our lives making us holy is called sanctification. This lesson is about the changes we can expect in our character and personality as we give ourselves over to the work of the Holy Spirit.

In Galatians 5:16-26 the Apostle Paul describes life in the Spirit. He says, first, that life in the Spirit differs from the life we lived before we knew Christ. How does it differ? In two fundamental ways. One, it means that we remove sin from our lives. We no longer engage in the same destructive, violent and self-indulgent behaviors we once did. Two, it means that we develop new behaviors and practices that reflect our character in Christ.

Fruit is a word in the Bible that is used to describe the results of God's work in our lives. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus said, "You will know them by their fruit." (Matthew 7:16) By making that statement, Jesus did not specifically identify the changes that will occur in the lives of believers, but He did insist that such changes will occur and that they will be obvious changes, making believers readily identifiable. Believers' lives will be changed by the Spirit. If we are not changing and improving, the implication is that we might not really be believers. In Galatians, Paul reveals more precisely the nature of the changes that will take place.

Believers are to grow in the nine characteristics identified by Paul. He calls them the fruit of the Spirit and that is a collective term. It indicates that we are to grow in all these areas. To grow only in one or two of them is not really an option. For example, we cannot grow in joy and love without also growing in patience. The Spirit is producing changes in our lives, making us more Christlike.

If it is the Holy Spirit who works these changes in our lives, what is our role in the process? Scripture teaches us that we have a very important role. We are called to "work out our salvation with fear and trembling." (Philippians 2:12) So while the Spirit does most of the work, we are, in a sense, co-workers in the process. A lack of effort on our part can frustrate the Spirit. Our commitment to working with the Spirit will help us grow.

It is my hope that this study will encourage you to take seriously the pursuit of the sanctified life. With God's help, our lives can be shaped for eternity; transformed to be a blessing.
